Furthermore, on February 20, we are cosponsoring a showing of the documentary Naji Al-Ali: An Artist with Vision, which will be presented by Professor Sadam Issa (Linguistics & Languages). On March 25, the Muslim Studies Program welcomes French journalist Cyril Payen, who will discuss his work on the Rohingya Muslim minorities in Burma. The Lebanese Civil Wars: History, Politics, Memory (Feb. 6-7)

In February, the Muslim Studies Program will host a two-day conference on the Lebanese civil wars. While the conference will map the current state of knowledge about these wars, we seek to do much more. In drawing together scholars of national and international stature to discuss Lebanese, Palestinian, Israeli experiences of this tragic fifteen year conflict, we seek to break new ground and to reconsider the wars' place within larger scholarly debates on the histories of Lebanon, contemporary Middle East politics and the nature and effects of protracted civil violence.

Confirmed presenters include Maren Milligan (Davidson College), Osamah Khalil (Syracuse University), Claire Launchbury (University of Leeds), Shea McManus (North Carolina State University), Augustus Richard Norton (Boston University), Ziad Abu Rish (UCLA), and certain MSU scholars.
