MSP Receives Templeton Religion Trust Grant






Muslim Journeys, 2022-23


Russell Lucas (James Madison College) published an article entitled "Public Attitudes on Peace with Israel in Jordanian Politics," in Middle Eastern Studies.

The Muslim Studies Program congratulates Professors Marc Bernstein, Timur Kocaoglu, and Jyotsna Singh on their well-deserved retirements!



Professor Marc Bernstein (Linguistics, Languages, and Cultures) taught courses on Hebrew literature and the Middle East. His research interests include the transfer of cultural artifacts between Muslim and Jewish societies; in particular, the pool of traditions surrounding biblical figures who also appear in Islam.



Professor Timur Kocaoglu (James Madison College) is a scholar of Central Eurasian Studies. He taught international relations and Turkic languages at MSU. He also served as associate director of the Center for European, Russian, and Eurasian Studies (CERES).



Professor Jyotsna G. Singh (English) taught and researched early modern literature and culture, including Shakespeare, travel writing, postcolonial theory, early modern histories of Islam, and gender and race studies, often exploring the intersections of these different fields and periods.
