Message from the Director



As you can see from our Spring Calendar of Events on page 2, this looks to be an eventful semester. Our first event is a Muslim Journeys discussion of The Awakening of Malcolm X, led by Pero Dagbovie (History) (Jan. 16). The lead author of The Awakening is the activist, writer, and daughter of Malcolm X, Ilyasah Shabazz. On Jan. 21, the author herself, Shabazz, will come to campus to deliver the 4th annual Malcolm X Muslim Studies Community Lecture. Two days later (Jan. 23), we will host a special presentation by Atiya Husain (Williams College), author of the new book, No God but Man: On Race, Knowledge, and Terrorism.

Later in the semester, new faculty member Saleh Ahmed (Sociology) will present

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his research on Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh (Feb. 11). On March 17, Ghassan Hage (Univ. of Melbourne) will deliver the 4th annual Malcolm & Ann Kerr Muslim Studies Community Lecture, a presentation on "Colonial Moralscapes: The Production of Humiliation and the Struggle for Dignity." The next day (March 18), Hannu Juusola (Univ. of Helsinki) will discuss "Orientalism without Empire."

We are also preparing for our exciting 18th annual conference, the title of which is "Aesthetics of Solidarity by Arab American and Arab/SWANA Diaspora Artists in the US, 1948-Present" (April 9-11). This conference—proposed and organized by Rachel Winter (Broad Art Museum) and Salah Hassan (English; Global Studies)—will feature numerous presenters, including keynote speaker, Mariam Ghani. Finally, we plan to hold our 7th annual Student Research Showcase for graduate and undergraduate MSU students on April 23 (submission deadline: March 28).

Established at MSU in 2006 and housed in International Studies and Programs, the Muslim Studies Program coordinates research, teaching, and outreach about Muslims and Muslim-majority societies and states. Additionally, it organizes lectures, workshops, and conferences on a wide range of topics that reflect the rich diversity of Muslims and Muslim communities around the world. The MSP is unique in the sense that instead of a regional focus, it has a global view of Muslims and Muslimmajority societies and states. It is an interdepartmental and interdisciplinary center whose faculty has appointments in various disciplines at MSU.



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# Muslim Studies Minor for Undergraduate Students

The Minor in Muslim Studies, administered by James Madison College, is available as an elective to students who are enrolled in bachelor's degree programs at Michigan State University. The minor provides students with the opportunity for sustained study of Muslim societies and Islam in a range of disciplines and topics.
