Message from the Director



As we enter our 19th year, the Muslim Studies Program remains as active as ever. Our fall events include presentations by writer, producer, and educator, Zara Chowdhary (Sept. 25-26); a screening of the documentary film, Gaza: Doctors under Attack (Sept. 16); a webinar on a coalition of NGOs offering life-saving services in the Middle East (Sept. 18); public historian Asad Dandia's "Virtual Tour of Arab, South Asian, and Muslim NYC and the Mayoral Elections" (Oct. 23); and Rachel Winter's in-person tour of the Diana Al-Hadid exhibition unbecoming (Nov. 12). We are also hosting three book talks: Shayan Rajani's Leaving Legacies: The Individual in Early Modern South Asia (Cambridge University Press) (Oct. 28), Nareman Amin's Is God for

Revolution? Affect, Youth, and Islam in Post-2011 Egypt (Oxford University Press) (Nov. 19); and Younus Mirza's The Islamic Mary: Maryam through the Centuries (Fortress Press) (Dec. 5).

Our dear colleague Jyotsna Singh has established an endowment in "Early Modern Studies, 1400-1800." This endowment includes an MSU Special Collections gallery exhibition (Sept. 16-Jan. 31) and an inaugural lecture by cultural historian João Vicente Melo on "Portuguese Encounters with the Indo-Persian Islamicate World: The Mughals and Safavids" (Oct. 16). Looking ahead to Spring 2026, you don't want to miss our 19th annual conference: "Does Islam Have a Liberation Theology?" (March 26-27). Student Spotlight: Farzaneh Holasu Ebrahimzadeh

Farzaneh Ebrahimzadeh Holasu is a Ph.D. candidate in Film Studies with Digital Humanities and Women/Gender studies specialization at MSU. Her research is centered on global cinema, feminist film historiography, and film/media archives. She is the assistant book review editor of the journal Screen, a member of the research team for Cinema Iranica, a graduate representative of SCMS (Society for Cinema and Media Studies) Gender and Feminisms Caucus, and a member of the editorial collective of Synoptique. Her work has been published in JCMS, Film Quarterly, and Screen. Her 2024 essay, which received the Muslim Studies Program's Best Student Paper award, will be published in ReFocus: The Films of Shirin Neshat (Edinburgh University Press) in 2026.



Muslim Journeys Book and Art Events, 2025-26

This year's Muslim Journeys series kicks off on Thursday, September 25, 7pm at the MSU Main Library with a special book discussion led by its author, Zara Chowdhary. Dr. Chowdhary's memoir, *The Lucky Ones* (2024), recounts surviving the 2002 massacres at Ahmedabad, India, and delves into the history of her multigenerational Muslim family. The book is widely available through MelCat and also available as a library ebook for MSU affiliates. This program is brought to you by a partnership with MSU's Creative Writing Program; many thanks to Dr. Divya Victor. Note that Dr. Chowdhary will also be giving the Kerr lecture the next day, Friday, September 26. Please join us for both events if you are able!





Building on last fall's eye-opening tour of the Samia Halaby exhibition, on November 12, curator Dr. Rachel Winter will lead us through *unbecoming*, an exhibition of paintings and sculptures by Diana al-Hadid. This exhibition explores questions of womanhood and femininity in the works of the Syrian-American artist Al-Hadid. Both Chowdhary's memoir and Al-Hadid's works weave and unravel ideals of gender. Come to the MSU Broad Art Museum at 6pm to view the works on your own, and meet us for the curator's tour beginning at 6:30.

On January 21, writer, activist, and politician Yusef Salaam will be our featured speaker at the Malcolm X Community Forum. Salaam is one of the Exonerated Five (also known as the Central Park Five), wrongly accused and convicted when he was a teenager. With Muslim Journeys, we'll read and discuss one of his books or possibly view one of the filmic versions of this true story of injustice.
