These events include a major teach-in on “Building Community” and “Resisting Hate” (Sept. 16); a lecture by Prof. Mohammed Ayoob on the “Changing Idea of India” (Sept. 24); a lecture by Mustafa Aksu on the current situation of Uyghurs in China (Oct. 5); a presentation by social activist Sheema Kermani on “Identity, Performance, and Gender in Pakistan” (Oct. 8 or 9—details TBA); a lecture by Dr. Souad Eddouada on “Women’s Land Rights in Morocco” (Oct. 21); a lecture by Prof. Nathalie Peutz on the Yemeni refugees in Djibouti (Nov. 6); our first *Muslim Journeys* event of 2019-20—a showing of the film *Meherjaan* and

an accompanying presentation by Prof. Martha Olcott (Nov. 12; see p. 2 for details); a lecture by Prof. Sarah Hillewaert on “Youth, Language, and Islam in Coastal Kenya” (Nov. 14); and a showing of the films *American Muslim* and *Sinkhole*, accompanied by a panel discussion (Nov. 20) (see the insert for the Fall 2019 schedule).

I am also happy to report that our 2019 annual conference (the theme was “Education under Siege”) facilitated critical discussions (see images on p. 3), and the organizers Stephen Gasteyer and Waseem El-Rayes intend to publish the proceedings. Incidentally, papers from the 2017 conference were recently published under the title *Muslims and US Politics Today: A Defining Moment* (ILEX and Harvard Univ. Press). Looking ahead, you don’t want to miss our 13th annual conference (April 16-17, 2020). The theme is “Islam, Environmental Science, and Conservation.”

Faculty Spotlight: Linda Sayed

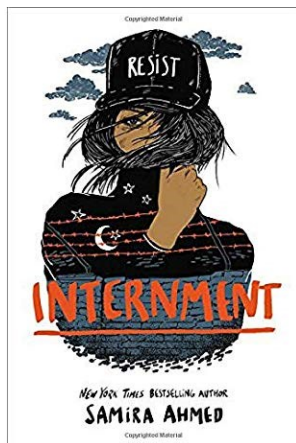
Linda Sayed is an assistant professor with a joint appointment in James Madison College and the College of Human Medicine at MSU. She is an interdisciplinary scholar of the Middle East specializing in the politics of identity formation, citizenship, and nationality as it relates to health rights among marginalized and minority communities in the Middle East and Arab diaspora. Her first project analyzes the legal integration of Shi’i Muslims into the newly created Lebanese nation-state under the French Mandate. Her current research project focuses on refugee’s rights to health services and the political infrastructures that determine accessibility to those services in the context of Lebanon. Her work brings awareness to limitations in global public health policies that are exacerbated by exclusionary citizenship regimes, politicalized interests, and infrastructural powers of the state.



Muslim Journeys Book and Film Discussion Series (2019-20)

On Tuesday November 12th we are screening our first full length feature film in a Muslim Journeys session. The film is *Meherjaan*, an anti-war, feminist Bangladeshi film directed by Rubaiyat Hossain. Professor Martha Olcott from James Madison College will give us context for the film, we'll watch the film together, and then discuss in small groups. (This session will start at 6pm and we'll have pizza!) The small group discussions are facilitated by stellar graduate students from disciplines including History, Education, and English. Graduate students have played an active role in suggesting books and films for this year's series and we are grateful for their active participation in many aspects of this series.



In the spring semester we will read and discuss several books, including the comics collection *Yes, I'm Hot in This: The Hilarious Truth about Life in a Hijab* by Huda Fahmy (in conjunction with the MSU Comics Forum), and *Internment*, a young adult novel set in a dystopian America, written by Samira Ahmed. The complete schedule is yet to come...we hope you will join us! All are welcome to participate in this free campus-community humanities programming.
