We must carry on in these challenging times. To this end, the Muslim Studies Program is preparing various virtual events this fall. Our “Islam, Environmental Science, and Conservation” conference has been rescheduled for October 15 - 16 (8am-12noon both days). But before then, Zahra Ayubi (Dartmouth) will present her new book, *Gendered Morality: Classical Islamic Ethics of Self, Family, and Society* (September 22, 6:30pm). Kyle Evered will discuss “Peasants, Poppies, and Popular Expressions of Turkish Nationalism amid the First Salvo in America’s ‘War on Drugs’” (Oct. 2, 3pm). And we will have our first *Muslim Journeys* book

club discussion on October 13 (see p. 2 for details). Later, Nazita Lajevardi will present her new book, *Outsiders at Home: The Politics of American Islamophobia* (October 29, 7pm). This will be followed by a lecture by Bedross Der Matossian (University of Nebraska-Lincoln) on “Armenians of Palestine/Israel: The Rise and the Decline of a Community” (Nov. 10, 12pm). One week later, Brahim Chakrani will discuss “Language Accommodation: Analyzing the Role of Attitudes in Interdialectal Arabic Encounters” (Nov. 17, 12pm). 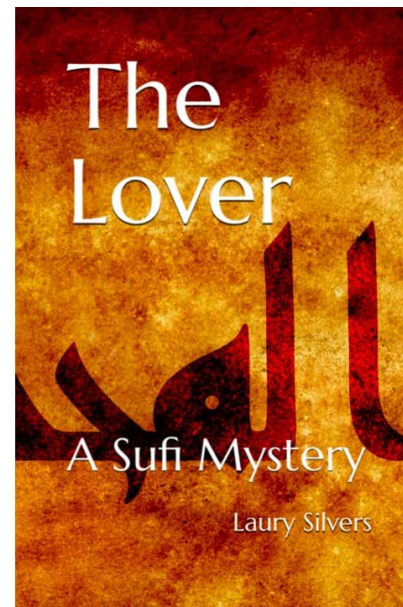
Muslim Journeys Book and Film Discussion Series (2020-21)

This fall, we're beginning our *Muslim Journeys* discussion group with the Great Michigan Read, *What the Eyes Don't See* by Dr. Mona Hanna-Attisha on the Flint water crisis—a topic relevant to the mid-October conference on “Islam, Environmental Science, and Conservation.” This event was postponed in the spring and will now be going forward in an online format (October 13, 7pm-9pm). Professor Stephen Gasteyer of the Department of Sociology will give us context for the book, before we break into smaller groups for more discussion. Join us for an evening examining how public health and public health crises impact marginalized communities and communities of color. Registration information coming soon. Graduate students continue to play an active role in shaping the series, including leading discussions and suggesting books and films to be covered.

In the spring semester, we will continue to feature books written by women, including *The Lover* by Laury Silvers and a comic in conjunction with the MSU Comics Forum. The complete schedule is forthcoming and we hope to see you at our future events! All are welcome to participate in this free campus-community humanities programming.

Faculty Accomplishments (2019-20) (Select)

Brahim Chakrani (Linguistics & Languages) was elected to serve a two-year term as President of the American Association of Teachers of Arabic (AATA), an eminent international association that was established in 1966.

Emine Evered (History) and **Kyle Evered** (Geography) published an article in *Journal of Historical Geography* on “tubercular geographies and gender in late Ottoman Turkey.” They also co-authored a chapter on “the shifting symbolism and spaces of beer in modern Turkey,” in W. Ernst (ed.), *Alcohol Flows across Cultures: Drinking Cultures in Transnational and Comparative Perspective* (Routledge).

Salah Hassan (English) was appointed Director of Global Studies in the Arts and Humanities at MSU.

Nazita Lajevardi (Political Science) published a book entitled *Outsiders at Home: The Politics of American Islamophobia* (Cambridge University Press).

Mara Leichtman (Anthropology) was awarded an ACLS/Luce fellowship and will be a 2020-21 Fellow of the Luce/ACLS Program in Religion, Journalism, and International Affairs for her book project entitled “Humanitarian Islam: Transnational Religion and Kuwaiti Development Projects in Africa.” She was also invited to write an epilogue entitled “Shi’a Cosmopolitanisms and Conversions,” in O. Scharbrodt and Y. Shanneik’s (eds.) recently published volume, *Shi’a Minorities in the Contemporary World: Migration, Transnationalism and Multilocality* (Edinburgh University Press).

Deborah Margolis (Libraries) received a US Fulbright Scholar award for “Creative Spaces for Diverse Students in Jordan, Palestine, and the United States: A Youth Participatory Action Research and Exchange Project.”

Stephanie Nawyn (Sociology) received a grant from Elrha, a UK-based foundation, to study how well practices to reduce the spread of COVID-19 are being implemented in refugee humanitarian interventions. The title of the project is “Using Humanitarian Engineering to Solve Social Distancing Barriers in Refugee Humanitarian Interventions: A Cross-Country Comparison of Turkey, Lebanon, and Jordan.” Nawyn is the PI, **Stephen Gasteyer** (Sociology) is the Co-PI. Gasteyer was also a presenter for an Institute for Palestine Studies panel entitled “Denying Life: The Annexation of Palestinian Water.”
